## **Smithsonian Hometown Teams Exhibit** Coming to the Fremont Library



Soccer. Hockey. Bowling. Kickball. Surfing. People around the country are drawn to compete in these sports and many others. Still more gather on the sidelines to cheer for their favorite athletes and teams. Nowhere do Americans more intimately connect to sports than in their hometowns. The Fremont Area District Library, in cooperation with the Michigan Humanities Council, will celebrate this connection as it hosts "Hometown Teams: How Sports Shape America," a traveling exhibition from the Smithsonian's Museum on Main Street program. "Hometown Teams" will be on view from December 4, 2016 through January 29, 2017. The Fremont Area District Library and the surrounding community has been expressly chosen by the Michigan Humanities Council to host "Hometown Teams" as part of the Museum on Main Street program—a national/state/ local partnership to bring exhibitions and programs to rural cultural organizations. Support for Museum on Main Street has been provided by the United States Congress. "Hometown Teams" will visit Fremont and four other small cities in Michigan.

Ray Arnett, director of the Fremont library, commented: "We are very excited about the opportunity to not only host a national exhibition, but also collect and display memorabilia, photos, and personal narratives about the role that sports has played in Newaygo County and in people's personal lives. Sports touches all of us and has shaped our community." Bob Santelli, the curator of "Hometown Teams" comments that "Few aspects of American culture so colorfully and passionately celebrate the American experience as sports."

"Hometown Teams" will capture the stories that unfold on the neighborhood fields and courts, and the underdog heroics, larger-than-life legends, fierce rivalries and gutwrenching defeats. For more than 100 years, sports have reflected the trials and triumphs of the American experience and helped shape the national character. Whether it is professional sports or those played on the collegiate or scholastic level, amateur sports or sports played by kids on the local playground, sports are everywhere in America.

## Summer Reading 2016 Wrap-up





In this year's Summer Reading Program, adults were encouraged to "Exercise Your Mind. READ!" and 100 patrons signed up to accept the challenge! Of those, 34 people completed the program and were eligible for the final prize drawing. Many other patrons partially completed the program, winning free ice cream, \$1 off library late fees, and a free book from the Friends Gift Shop. Diana Whittle was the 1st prize winner of a \$30 gift card, and Angela Owens won the 2nd prize--a \$20 Barnes & Noble gift card.

62 teens spent their summer exploring the "Get in the Game. READ!" theme by joining us for some great craft and movie programs and, of course, reading. Each teen set their own reading goal and chose the amount of time that each square on their reading log was worth. 77 readers signed up for the program, 36 teens completed their reading logs, and 3 more partially completed their logs. Prize winners this year were: Lydon C. - \$50 Visa gift card; Kyla R. - 32 G flash drive; and Isaiah B. – a summer fun pack.

The youngsters had an eventful summer as well with 2,491 people attending 25 programs! As part of our "On Your Mark, Get Set...READ!" activities, we learned about exercising our minds and bodies. We heard stories, learned how to create choreography, and sang songs. We even got to hula hoop, meet puppets, and pet animals at the Petting Zoo! 368 children registered for the summer reading program, and many of them finished and won prizes, including pizza and new books.



# Help Young Kids Become Lifelong Learners



Research shows that what kids learn in their first few years of life—and in their day-to-day conversations with parents—can have lasting effects on their future success and health. Simple things like encouraging early math, reading, and language skills can lead to higher grades, a better chance of staying in school and going to college, fewer teen pregnancies, improved mental health, and even a longer life.

#### **Encourage Early Learning**

- Read to your child, beginning when she or he is an infant.
- Listen and respond to kids as they learn to talk. Pause to give them a chance to "speak" in coos, grunts, and eventually words.
- Practice counting together.
- Point out and talk with children about the names, colors, shapes, numbers, and sizes of objects around them.
